#### **OSL HEROES**

he other day I helped deliver the food we, OSL, prepare daily for the Nicklesville residents. Nicklesville is a city of tents that is built up on old wood pallets and covered with tarps. There are three portable toilets and a fire pit where the folks gather to get warm. There is no running water, no heat, and no food. OSL brings a hot mid-day meal Monday through Friday. There are approximately 100 adults in residence as well as several children, most are under the age of 10. As hard as it is to see adults living in this kind of environment, it is devastating to know that children have to live this way, and it matters to be able to offer a little bit of comfort, a little bit of ease.

What if every day you knew you were changing a life for the better or maybe even saving someone who is hungry and living

without hope? What if there was one simple thing you could do today that might change or even save a life?

This is what you allow us to do every day of the year. It is not our work, it is your work, made possible by *you*, each one of our supporters; because of your generosity, compassion, and trust. We simply can't do it without you. *You* are the heroes of OSL.

In our newsletters, I write about program updates, our statistics, our accomplishments, and our hopes and dreams. This information is helpful for our supporters to make a connection with the extent of the work we do that is made possible by dedicated support. I know that when people are starving and in need, statistics do not matter, nor does it matter if the food is nutritional, healthful, or even tastes good; but it does matter to us.


It matters to us that the 1200 meals we serve daily, 3 meals each day, every day of the year, are tasty, healthful, and made of quality ingredients. It matters that the guests we serve feel cared for, valued, and honored.

In our 23rd year of service OSL continues to change and save lives. We provide meals for six shelters, one transitional housing facility, three permanent housing facilities, two youth day programs, 3 adult day programs, Nicklesville, the Real Change vendors, and the community court system of Seattle. That's approximately 200 tons of food each year prepared and served by the OSL staff and volunteers!!!

These statistics mean nothing without the true heroes of our program. YOU! Our supporters! You help us achieve our mission statement every day.

Although we understand our mission statement is lofty and broad in nature, and is as imperative today as it was when it was created by the first OSL board:

- To provide dignity, care, and compassion through action, with the example that each person can make a difference.
- To educate and advocate acceptance and understanding of each other's differences.
- To ultimately bring about the realization that we are all a vital part of this world and with extended effort put an end to homelessness, hunger and hatred.



Serving more than 3 million meals in the last 23 years, OSL has been a nutritional resource and a tool for those who struggle each day with

hunger. We provide dignity by offering delicious meals, prepared with quality ingredients and served with care, kindness, no requirements, or judgment.

We work each day to encourage compassion for those we serve, those who serve with us and for each other.

We understand that although we have different walks in life, different experiences, different authority in our positions, we are born innately equal and deserving of those things which generate equity/balance and grace. We also embrace a generous amount of humor, patience, and empathy. All we do, all we have done, has been made possible by our OSL supporters. #### What's that Smell???

n August 19th 2011, the hottest day of 2011, the OSL walk-in freezer, donated by Fratelli Ice Cream in 1994, failed. Our freezer host at St. John Vianney Catholic Church in Kirkland, WA, called us and said "there is something stinky in Denmark". The odiferous aroma of rotting fish, beef, chicken, (you get the picture, or the smell!), was curling its way up to the second floor where the sanctuary and offices are located. OSL Operations Director Krista and Chef Taran arrived to find a congealed mess of rotting and thawed high protein foods; halibut, salmon, free range chickens, turkey, beef, mixed in with some frozen organic veg and cheese, and "my oh my" what a mess! The compressor on the freezer went out and blew the circuit to the freezer and we lost approximately \$25,000 worth of high protein foods. We sent out an SOS and our friends on Facebook, KING and KOMO



TV, KING Radio, and The Seattle Restaurant Store came to our rescue. By mid-September our freezer was up and running again, \$12,425 worth of donations came in to replace our lost food, and our insurance company covered \$10,000. We never missed a meal thanks to your

generosity and care. We are still trying to rebuild our inventory. A whopping "Thank You"!

#### THANK YOU BOEING EMPLOYEES COMMUNITY FUND

N 2005 the Seattle Foundation helped OSL purchase our first full size Chiller Van. Our dream of rescuing some of the millions of pounds of food that is tossed into the waste stream began. With the purchase of the Chiller



we were able to formalize our food rescue program and through a collaboration with the ELP Program from Seattle



University, FOOD IN MOTION was born. In just a couple of years our rescue and redistribution program had grown so tremendously that we needed an additional vehicle to accommodate all of our pickups. In steps the Boeing

Employees Community Fund with an amazingly generous donation of \$35,000 which purchased our new Ford Transit Connect Chiller Van!!! Thank BECF!!!

## A Whole Load of Scrap

hen the OSL freezer malfunctioned in mid August we had a lot of people come to our aid. Donations came in the form of cash, food, labor to repair the damaged freezer, and a whole load of scrap metal. Scrap metal!? Really?

It does seem like an odd thing to donate but Andrea Ivancich, owner of Seattle Interiors, had a brilliant idea. The idea is now known as the "Scrapapoolza 2011 Campaign". Andrea started a drive to collect any unwanted non-ferrous metal taking other people's garbage and turning it into cash by recycling it at Pacific Iron and Metal. Word of the campaign spread through Facebook, word of mouth, and Andrea promoted it through her contacts in the plumbing and construction industry. In the end they collected 1,498 lbs of metal which turned into a \$2,535.98 donation to OSL. WOW!!!

Andrea then came up with another way to turn unwanted things into cash for OSL...Jewelry parties anyone?

#### **OSL Board member**

OSL board member Captain Van Chaney is the 777 deputy chief engineering test pilot. As an engineering test pilot, Van conducts flight tests of new aircraft designs and establishes the basic airworthiness of the

aircraft and verifies that it functions as designed.

Captain Chaney joined Boeing in 1996 as an engineer in Flight Test Operations. In 1999, he moved to the Flight Test Pilot organization where he worked as a 737 and 757 system operator and production test pilot. Chaney became an engineering test pilot in 2004 and has been involved in testing the 777-200LR, the 777 Quiet Technology Demonstration, the Next-Generation 737 short-field performance aircraft, he conducted the first flight of the 737-900ER, the 737 Tech Insertion Engine, the 777 auxiliary fuel tank program, the 777 performance enhanced combustor program, he conducted the first flight of the 777 freighter and is currently flying ZA002, Boeing's second 787.

Prior to joining Boeing, Van worked as a test pilot for the Raspet Flight Research Laboratory at Mississippi State University where he helped develop and fly numerous composite prototypes, including the Honda Jet. He was also involved in performance tests of the American General AA5 Tiger and other small aircraft programs. He served in the United Stated Air Force as a Captain between 1984 and 1988 where as a Test Director he conducted developmental test of the Advanced Medium Range Missile (AMRAAM) on the F-16 and F-15 aircraft.

Chaney earned a Bachelor's degree in Aerospace Engineering in 1984 and a Master's degree in Aerospace Engineering in 1990 at Mississippi State University. He is also a 2008 graduate of Seattle University's Executive Leadership program.

Van has been sharing his expertise and wisdom as an OSL board member for the past two years and was instrumental in developing the OSL Food In Motion program, and helped OSL secure a grant from the Boeing Employees Community Fund that allowed us to purchase a new Ford Transit Connect refrigerated van for our food rescue program.
